### **Editor's Notes**

My term as the Editor of the SIGMOD RECORD is ending by the end of 2004. I am delighted to present you my last issue and also the last issue of 2004.

#### Overview of the Issue

This issue features a special topic section on Semantic Integration, in addition to articles from six regular sections: Articles, Book Reviews, Distinguished Database Profiles, Influential Papers, Workshop Reports, and ACM TODS development.

The special topic section is guest edited by AnHai Doan, Natalya Noy, Alon Halevy. It consists of ten articles, covering various issues and technical challenges on semantic integration, ranging from scalability of semantic integration with respect to the size of the schema, user interface issues, to challenges in schema mapping maintenance. The first article is contributed by the guest editors. It consists of an overview of this special topic section and a short survey on semantic integration, which covers the problem definition, important semantic matching techniques, and current challenges for developing semantic matching systems.

Following the special topic section, we present you a research article on requirements and architecture for ubiquitous data access by Abdelsalam Helal and Joachim Hammer. It describes the UbiData architecture, aiming at providing anywhere and anytime data accesss and promoting any-device and any-application computing paradigm.

In the *Distinguished DB Profiles* column, we present an interview with C. Mohan by Marianne Winslett. Mohan is well-known for his work on transaction commitment, logging, and recover. He is currently the technical team lead for the DBCache project at IBM Almaden Research Center. This interview article is both interesting and enjoyable to read. Mohan speaks about many issues, including his experience with R\*, the first project he had at IBM, the technology transfer of ARIES, *the research issues in messaging and queuing systems, life and expectations as one of 56 IBM Fellows*, the things he would like to do if extra time is given, and more.

The *Book Reviews* section contains two book reviews and an introduction article contributed by Karl Aberer, the associate editor for Book Reviews. Karl briefly describes the two book reviews and presents a list of books that are call for reviews in 2005.

This issue presents you with three workshop reports organized by Brian Cooper, the new associate editor for the workshop reports and technical notes. The first report summarized the events and discussions at the EDBT summer school on XML and Databases, contributed by Riccardo Torlone and Paolo Atzeni. The second report by Ioana Manolescu and Tannis Papakonstantinou, gives an overview of the workshop on the XQuery implementation, Experience, and Perspectives, which was held this year in Paris, France, incorporation with the ACM SIGMOD conference. The third workshop

report is contributed by Hiemstra and Mihajlovic, featuring the first Twente Data Management workshop on XML databases and Information Retrieval.

In ACM TODS Development column, Rick Snodgrass (EIC) briefly summarizes the changes to the ACM TODS editorial board.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to all the contributing associate editors, the guest editors AnHai Doan, Natalya Noy, Alon Halevy, all authors, and reviewers for their excellent work and their contributions to this high quality issue.
